


Sailing with Kids and the Mystery of the Blue-Eyed Fish at Block Island - Chris Winalski, JN

In July, we took our longest family sailing trip to date – a four-day, overnight excursion to Block Island from Mystic. It was the family's first 'offshore' experience. The outcome?

<u>From Dad's view</u>: Piloting the boat through Mystic and Fisher's Island Sound for the first time required all that I could draw upon from my route planning. The time I spent considering various passages over a chart in my dining room was time well spent. My coursework at DSPS prepared me for a safe planned passage.

<u>From the kids' view</u>: They are both prolific swimmers at home so getting the opportunity to swim off the back of the boat was a treat for them. My son Will enjoyed being cooped up with Mom and Dad on the boat. He said it gave him time to talk with us. Go figure. Our youngest Jack loved following me around the boat learning about every button, control, and gadget. He's at the age where his favorite questions are "Why?" and "How?" He learned about the electrical panel, the gas cutoff, how to operate the head, how to start the engine, how to use the VHF, where the water and diesel are stored, what the radar does ... the list goes on.



The trip had many firsts for all of us. We came back with many memories, many funny stories, and a weekend with lots of down time for reading, hiking around Block Island, and hanging out.

And, about that blue-eyed fish...When swimming off the boat, Will was certain he saw a huge fish pursuing with two blue eyes. Once on deck, he confirmed his observations and pointed the fish out to us. He spent a day agonizing over the "blue-eyed fish" only to come to learn that it was phosphorescent plankton.
